From there the group plans to travel to Locavore Farm in Grant Park for a Dine On The Land outdoor dining experience.

The Friday program currently being developed will (if all things come together properly) start off with breakfast at Beans-Barley Brews (https://www.facebook.com/Beans-Barley-Brews-152804722175982/) followed by tours of Janie's Mill (https://www.janiesmill.com/) featuring organic flours and breads and ending at Janie's farm (https://www.janiesfarm.com/).

The exact hotel base is still being considered but will be in the Bradley/Kankakee area. Information on lodging will be forthcoming as soon as a resting place is determined.

"Our plans call for all of our group to travel on a motor coach on Thursday. On Friday we will travel in personal vehicles because of the short distances. This will also allow our members to leave directly from Jamie's Farm at the close of the activities there.

"We will get out all the details along with fees and lodging information as soon as it becomes available," Bernhard says. "In the meantime, plan on attending August 4 and 5."

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
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Take A Closer Look



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Land Values Rising at Unprecedented Rate

Unprecedented' describes the land market throughout 2021 and into the early stages of 2022. We ended 2021 incredibly strong with lots of action and we sit here in early 2022 trying to decipher where the wild ride will end." These are the opening comments from Luke Worrell, AFM, ALC, Worrell Land Services, Jacksonville, IL, chair of the 2022 Land Values Conference held in Bloomington, IL on March 17.

Citing increases being paid for farmland as high as 26 percent compared to a year ago, Worrell says "Across the state we have seen meteoric rises in prices across all classifications of land. Leading the charge was Class A or 'Excellent' acreage which saw a jump of 26 percent. It is a number that can take your breath away, but across the entire state the regions with Class A farmland experienced a rise of 30 percent from two years ago."

Worrell notes that the dramatic increases didn't end with Class A acreage. "Lower land category classifications like Good were up 24 percent. Average farmland was up over 20 percent. Even Fair land was up 5 percent and recreational or mixed-use properties elevated significantly throughout certain pockets of the state."

He adds, "There is no doubt we ended 2021 strong with some legs left to this market. If anything, the sales that took place in the first half of 2021 likely reduced the overall averages. The calendar flipped at the end of December with land sales on the upswing and not retreating."

The Drivers

Worrell noted that many growers were able to sell their 2021 grain nearly 50 percent higher than they did with their 2020 grain. "It stands to reason that when potential gross farm income can see that jump, values could rise. Additionally, interest rates are still historically low. Borrowing strength is strong and there are many cash buyers out there as well. Historically speaking, land can be very bullish in unsettling turbulent times as many see it as a hedge on inflation," he continues. "Also, the supply of readily available farms was down in 2020 meaning that pent up demand loomed throughout 2021."

One of the more interesting phenomena of 2021 was the sheer number of sales, particularly auctions, that took place

in the fall, Worrell notes. "We saw more Class A, Excellent quality acres be put on the auction block than in recent memory. With those auctions came a wide variety of auction methods as that world changed thanks to COVID-19. While we still see a majority of local buyers, the presence of large institutional buyers and "mega-wealthy" interest has increased over the last year."

Cash rents are also on the rise

According to Gary Schnitkey, Ph.D., University of Illinois, who shared the podium with Worrell, "The mid-year survey we did last August projected an average rise in rent fees of 12 percent, but our year-end numbers show that a figure closer to 20 percent is what ended up happening more frequently than not."

He explained that Per Acre Cash Rents for 2022 for Excellent farmland ranges from \$400 at the top end to \$300 in the lower 1/3. Those same ranges for Good land vary from \$360 at the top to \$250 at the lower 1/3. Average farmland varies from \$300 at the top to \$215 at the bottom. Fair land ranges from \$250 per acre to \$160.

"There are two types of cash rent leases: traditional and variable," Schnitkey explains. Under a traditional lease, a fixed amount of cash rent is negotiated between the land owner and tenant, typically at the beginning of the crop year. Under a variable lease, the amount of the cash payment depends on revenue. A typical variable lease has a fixed base payment and then a "bonus" payment. The bonus payment is a percentage of gross revenue when gross revenue exceeds a specified level. In 2022, traditional crop share arrangements will account for 28 percent of leases while variable cash leases had a 36 percent share of leases.

"Farm managers typically use short lease terms on cash rental arrangements. Of cash rents, 81 percent of the leases were one-year in length," he notes.



An audience of 150 members and public visitors turned out for the 2022 Illinois Land Values Conference held March 17 in Bloomington. In addition to speakers on the economy and the land values report itself, there was also a panel discussion on what happened in 2021 with farmland auctions. Service to Agriculture **Award**

In honoring Guebert, Baker noted his lifelong commitment to public service in Illinois agriculture including appointments by Illinois governors to various boards, missions and task forces. Prior to becoming IFB's 15th president, Guebert was vice president of the organization. He also serves as president of COUNTRY Financial, Illinois Agricultural Service Company and the IAA Foundation and represents IFB on the coordinating committee for GROWMARK, Inc. The award is the highest citation given to a non-member by the Society. Guebert and his wife Nancy reside in Ellis Grove.



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Farming is a challenging and sometimes dangerous business. Weather, machinery, logistics and livestock can cause difficulties within a day's work in the field.

Yet these can pale next to the concerns and stress that a farmer carries inside. The pressure to be productive and profitable comes with the acreage, and may seem as fixed as the land itself.

Being human, a farmer may also face problems in his or her personal life. The tendency to be self-reliant and keep busy can make caring for one's health – both physical and mental – an afterthought.

A new support system is available to help the Illinois farming community. It's as close as your phone. A helpline (1-833-FARM-SOS) will connect farmers to health professionals and services as part of a new statewide program. The Farm Family Resource Initiative (FFRI) is a program managed by the SIU School of Medicine's Center for Rural Health and Social Service Development. FFRI has created a statewide network of resources to address the mental health needs of the farming and agricultural workforce. In addition to the 24-hour helpline, farmers can access free webinars, blogs and trainings on psychological signs of stress at the website siumed.edu/farm.

"We've designed the program to give ongoing outreach, education and training to our rural partners," said Karen Stallman, FFRI agricultural resource specialist. "We want to improve the health and safety of farm families. It's another toolkit they can use to keep well and productive."

SIU Medicine conducted a needs assessment in 2020 that found 2 out of 3 Illinois farmers considered farm-related stress and mental health to be significant problems. In addition to the regular stresses of farm management, the pandemic has created labor and supply chain disruptions.


In 2021, the Illinois Department of Agriculture received a \$500,000 USDA grant that allowed expansion of the FFRI's pilot program to all 102 counties. "The state brought federal funding to help a segment of the rural population," said Stallman, "and our medical community was there, ready to step up."

"SIU School of Medicine has a mission of social accountability and bringing better health to central and southern Illinois," said Jerry Kruse, MD, MSPH, dean and provost of SIU School of Medicine. "The Farm Family Resource Initiative is a great fit for us and our rural partners – we're putting the resources where they are needed most, right in the farmers' hands."

Mental health professionals from Memorial Behavioral Health in Springfield staff the helpline. The counselors have both medical expertise and knowledge of the factors that affect farming. The phone number is 1-833-327-6767 (1-833-FARM-SOS). The website, siumed.edu/farm, has new content and resources added regularly.

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
